

As many of you know, I tried last year to give words of inspiration with each newsletter. Duane Cacali joined BVA last year as a new member. He is a very accomplished artist, and is a member of both Pittsburgh Society of Artists and Associated Artists of Pittsburgh. And not to embarrass him or Jean Sirko, but a cool fact is that Jean was his high school art teacher.

Duane wrote this article about what helps shape a person into a better artist. I hope you all start to think about what you think makes you a better artist. If anyone else would like to add their statement to a future newsletter, either email Jocelyn or me.

Duane Cacali: What I have found that helps to shape me into being a better artist is:

- **A .Believe in yourself:** Don't let others take from you what you feel can and will work for you. If you have a good idea, vision or technique play it out. Give your ideas time to be tested.
- **B.** Perseverance: I feel you must have a whole lot of this. Without perseverance and I mean a strong perseverance you can't and won't go very far as an artist who wants to exhibit their work. Don't be pushy, don't get discouraged and don't give up.
- **C. Creativity:** Most artists have it but sometimes get overwhelmed by so many art techniques and styles. Artists should discover what they like most and develop that skill, but still remain open to new media and other styles of art. Art is very subjective and always changing. Remaining open minded will allow receptivity to new ideas and enhance creativity.
- **D. Rejection:** No one likes to feel left out but if your piece of art did not get into an exhibition you probably are not alone. Look at it this way: Every juror has their opinion. What they choose may not be what you like but another juror may feel differently about your art. Another exhibition will come up and the piece that did not get in may make it into another exhibition. If it doesn't, then create something new and try again. Keep focused and remember that most artists are creating art because they love what they are doing.
- **E. Socializing:** Get out of your studio. Go visit one of your artist friends, have lunch with them. Go to exhibitions openings. Mingle with someone new and let them talk about their art. When they are finished you can talk about yours. It's a two way street. You learn something every time another artist speaks to you and they learn something from you.
- **F. Stay Connected:** Keep in touch with your art association. Read the newsletters. Go to the meetings and most important step up and volunteer to help at your art association. There are plenty of things that have to be done and nice people to work with. Read books, visit art galleries, take classes, use the internet and enter all the exhibitions you want to enter. If you don't enter your work, how will anyone ever know who you are and what you can do? You have to market yourself. No one can do it as well as you.
- **G. Being a member of an Artist's association:** This by far has helped me the most. Belonging to a good artists' association makes it easier to meet fellow artists to exchange honest constructive interest in each others art works. The association can offer good seminars to promote personal enrichment. Plus the associations have well planned opening receptions for exhibitions where the artists can not only display their work but they can also talk about it. Art Associations sponsor juried exhibitions with and without themes that stimulate artists to enter and create new pieces of art work. Also being an active member in an art association gives the artist the ability to make long-lasting friendships with other artists. With these relationships artists can stay connected and encourage and support each others art.

Duane also added:

Getting into my first juried exhibition was so gratifying. It was fantastic. I felt I had arrived as an artist. The truth is I was just beginning to become a better artist. I had to learn that although you submit your best work, sometimes you just don't get in. When I got an OUT letter for a piece of art I had entered it never felt good. Then some of my best art came after not getting into a juried art exhibition. A few days or a week later I would sit down and think about what can I do to create art that is better. So I would create something new. Sometimes those pieces got juried into an exhibition. And if it did not get in I would start all over again. I work with art because I appreciate it; I am a part of it and love creating it.
